



Built in the 1960s, the East-West Corridor links the state's \$800 million investment in the Marquette Interchange and ongoing \$1.6 billion investment in the Zoo Interchange.

## Why can't Wisconsin just resurface the road?

WisDOT looked closely at the resurfacing option and had this to say:

"In general, each highway resurfacing has a shorter life span than the previous resurfacing because the original pavement, still in place after 50 years, provides a less effective base as the concrete continues to crack and deteriorate...Based on WisDOT's experience with other highways, resurfacing the study area freeway system again would not be cost effective."

The East-West Corridor has been resurfaced numerous times over its almost 60-year life, most recently in 2011-12. But at this point, another resurfacing would be a Band-Aid restoring the road's smooth riding surface for a few years while doing nothing to solve the underlying safety, capacity, and traffic-handling problems.



36 of the 38 bridges (overpasses) in the corridor are original to the Interstate, dating back to the 1960s.

"The age of these bridges is concerning and can lead to load postings, safety issues and operational issues."
